Bourgeois culture can be undermined by encouraging a certain type of pseudo-philosophical doubt. This kind of scepticism needs to be applied selectively, however. It would not do to query attempts to solve global poverty, for example.

In some cases, boggling generates unanswerable questions, and hence engenders intellectual capitulation. This is helpful to mediocracy, as it can be used to encourage unthinking acceptance of the prevailing ideology.

In other cases, the purpose of boggling is to block real questioning, by signalling that an issue has become taboo. *What are universities for?* it is asked, for example. But there is no intention of considering as a possible answer: *for giving scope to the most intelligent*, as this answer conflicts with mediocratic ideology. Such boggling helps to confuse potential critics, if they are ingenuous enough to believe it constitutes genuine deliberation or openness to debate.
